Wildfires and the ELCIC National Convention

You will have heard that wildfires have been causing mass evacuations, largely in Canadas north and west. It has been reported that Winnipeg has run out of hotel rooms and has been sending evacuees to Ontario. In the midst of this, the ELCIC will be holding a national convention in Winnipeg from July 10 to 13. Jan Hansen, a member of our congregation, has been elected to be a delegate at this convention. The convention is a necessary thing, in part because we will be electing a new national bishop, but the timing and placement of the convention puts a strain on local resources.

With the advice of conference organizers, we would like to give members of St. Stephen an opportunity to contribute to supporting evacuees. One of their suggested organizations was the Canadian Red Cross' Manitoba Wildfires Appeal. These donations will be used for assisting those impacted by the wildfires in Manitoba with immediate and ongoing relief including financial assistance, support to evacuees and the communities hosting them, recovery and resilience efforts in response to the wildfires, as well as supporting community preparedness and risk reduction for future all-hazard disaster events within Manitoba.

May Financial Report

In May we took in about the same as what we spent. From January to May we have spent almost \$6000 more than we have taken in. From January to May, our income was lower than budgeted, but so was our expenses. Our giving from January to May 2025 was higher than our giving in the same months in 2024.

Bringing in more than last year is encouraging. We do have a deficit, but it is typical for churches to run a bit of a deficit right up until Christmas, when a larger set of gifts often come in. It should be noted that our monthly expenses will go up, starting in June, because we will begin paying for a fulltime pastor.

Putting something down in order to pick something else up

On September 13, 2020 we were not yet worshipping in-person. In the recorded worship for that Sunday pastor Richard said, "We begin today with the first of a new series of family friendly special messages for our young people. Take it away Jan." That was the first video message in what would become a long series of messages. It is about buttons. I have posted it again and you can check it out here: https://youtu.be/G7iKBQjXAJI

I have recorded a new message for every Sunday since then (and sometimes a few more around advent and lent). It evolved from something that was only part of worship (both online and in-person), to something that was also posted on YouTube as a stand-alone video, to something that lived only on YouTube.

It has been a wonderful discipline to look at the assigned Bible readings each week and pull at the threads of an idea that it brings to mind. My faith has developed because of this practice. I have reached a point, though, where some of the people in my life need me to turn my attention to some new needs that have been developing. So I intend to lay down this practice of Biblical exploration and making short videos about it. I will continue for the next few weeks, possibly until I have reached a full five years of videos.

I want to thank the congregation for giving me the space to do this exploration, and I urge each of you to try a new practice that prods you to expand and explore your own faith.

My Perspective: Two Roads - Carolyn R. Wilker

Many lessons we need to learn over and over again. It didn't stick the first time or the second. It was true for the Israelites in Old Testament times and true for disciples in Jesus' New Testament time. Still true today for us.

We've been given a choice. It's called free will, in that we get to choose how we live.

There's a poem by Robert Frost called "<u>The Road Not Taken</u>" where the poet encounters two roads, and he wonders aloud which one to take. (This is not a poetry lesson, in case you didn't like poetry in school.) Frost writes in the poem:

Two roads diverged in a yellow wood,

And sorry I could not travel both

And be one traveler, long I stood

And looked down one as far as I could

To where it bent in the undergrowth...

"Mountain Interval marked Frost's turn to another kind of poem, a brief meditation sparked by an object, person or event."

We too can meditate on a person, place or event that has an effect on our choices.

While you may not write it in poetry, you can ponder the meaning of a person, place or time that had its greatest effect on your choices. You can just think about, or talk with a friend about it. Or if you're a writer, you might make journal entries about these choices.

Frost's poem is a poetic way of sharing the aspect of choice.

We too have choices to make. Do we follow the world with all its challenges, or do we travel a different path, while living in that world? One that invites us to have a relationship with Jesus (John 14:6). I hope you chose the latter. That road can be bumpy too, but staying with it can make the difference.

Frost writes the end of his poem:

Two roads diverged in a wood, and I—

I took the one less traveled by,

And that has made all the difference.
